- a. The time of discovery.
- b. The exact location of the device.
- c. A full description of the device (e.g., size, shape, markings, construction).
- d. The anticipated danger zone and perimeter.
- e. The areas to be evacuated or cleared.

## **404.6 EXPLOSION/BOMBING INCIDENTS**

When an explosion has occurred, there are multitudes of considerations which may confront the responding officer(s). As in other catastrophic events, a rapid response may help to minimize injury to victims, contamination of the scene by gathering crowds, or any additional damage from fires or unstable structures.

## 404.6.1 OFFICER CONSIDERATIONS

Officers responding to explosions, whether accidental or a criminal act, should consider the following actions:

- 1. Assess the scope of the incident, including the number of victims and extent of injuries.
- 2. Request additional personnel and resources, as appropriate.
- 3. Assist with first aid.
- 4. Identify and take appropriate precautions to mitigate scene hazards, such as collapsed structures, blood borne pathogens and hazardous materials.
- 5. Assist with the safe evacuation of victims, if possible.
- 6. Establish an inner perimeter to include entry points and evacuation routes. Search for additional or secondary devices.
- 7. Preserve evidence.
- 8. Establish an outer perimeter and evacuate if necessary.
- 9. Identify witnesses.

### 404.6.2 NOTIFICATIONS

When an explosion has occurred, the following people should be notified as appropriate:

- 1. City/County Dispatch
- 2. Fire Department
- 3. Bomb Squad
- 4. Chief of Police, or the Assistant Chief of Police in their absence.
- 5. Other law enforcement agencies, including local, state or federal agencies, such as the FBI and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF).
- 6. Other government agencies, as appropriate

### 404.7 CROWD CONTROL

Only authorized Department members, first responders and mutual aid partners with a legitimate need should be permitted access to the scene. Spectators and other unauthorized individuals should be restricted to a safe distance as is reasonably practicable given the available resources and personnel.
