I. ITEM – FIRST READING

Item 93.a Gen Ed Course: M 161 Survey of Calculus. Submit for category I. A. Mathematics.

Don Wilathgamuwa, Math Department, stated that Bozeman has had this course for a long time. The course has less emphasis on proofs and more on methods and applications. They surveyed students and found about one third of our students could take this course, another third need to take M 171 Calculus I, and the last third were unclear since they had not declared a major. This new course will include parts of Calculus I, II, and III. The College of Business would like to add this course to their curriculum.

Feedback from faculty seems to be positive. Many majors have added a second writing course, and the English faculty are coordinating special major-focused sections. The sciences department could not agree on a second writing course for science majors.

D. COMPASS Test Update

The Academic Senate did vote to end the usage of the COMPASS test for awarding credit for writing courses. A challenge mechanism for WRIT 101 is still in process, but students are no longer being given a "P" grade in WRIT 101 for earning a 99 or better on the COMPASS.

III. ANNOUNCEMENT

This Friday is the Undergraduate Research and Creativity Symposium. They currently have over 60 students entered, plus 24 art students in the juried art show. The program begins at 1:00 p.m. with the Chancellor speaking, and student oral presentations begin at 2:00 p.m. We are showcasing what we are already doing at MSUB!
